Pleven also was believed unlikely to muster the necessary majority in the National Assembly, although he is a skillful conciliator who twice served as premier, in 1950 and 1952.

He has the advantage of having kept carefully on the sidelines during the recent battles over Algeria and French economic policies. But in order to be chosen premier, he would have to put together a coalition broad enough to withstand the strong opposition of Communists on the extreme left and Poujadists on the extreme right. If any large center groups opposed him, his task would be hopeless.

Pleven is a member of the small Democratic and Socialist Union of Resistance, slightly left of center in the 15-party National Assembly. The UDSR has held an influence far out of proportion to its size because it often has held the balance of power.
