

Drive for Quotas on Foreign Oil, Steel Killed by Leaders

WASHINGTON — A Senate drive to impose protectionist import quotas on foreign-produced oil, steel and other major commodities was called off for this session Tuesday in a top level leadership decision.

Sen. Russell B. Long, D., La., Senate majority whip and chairman of the finance committee, made it plain that the quota action was merely being "deferred" for strategic reasons and not actually cancelled, however.

Long said that he, Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, R., Ill., and other leading members of his committee, plan to prepare a comprehensive "package" to protect major United States industries from competition imports, for action in the Congress convening in January.

Long said he saw no point

in tying the import quota package to a minor house-approved measure in the dying days of this session. Dirksen earlier took much the same line.

"If we did that," said Long in an interview, "the president could kill it by a pocket veto, and we would not even have an opportunity to vote to override."

The lone exception from the "package" quota strategy of Long and Dirksen will be made in the case of the textile industry, it was indicated.

Textile manufacturers have been pressing for import quota action now, and Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D., S.C., will carry the legislative ball for them. Hollings, who is up for reelection next year in his textile-producing state, has announced he will try to tie his quota amendment to the house-approved "Chinese gooseberry bill."

Long said he will not stand in Hollings' way if the South Carolina Democrat wants to

make the attempt. But even if the Senate approves Hollings' amendment, as it probably will, the "gooseberry" measure appears headed for the shelf in the house or death by veto.

The Long-Dirksen strategy is to wait until next year when they can attach their more comprehensive quota package to a major trade or revenue measure, which the president cannot afford to veto.

Figure in Rescues

Dr. Thomas Techman, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Michael Techman, 1280 Coffeen street, has been a key figure in unusual rescue operations since he became a member of the U.S. Public Health service and senior medical officer at Ediz Hook coast guard station, Port Angeles, Wash.

Early in October he was called to treat an injured man who had fallen down a 150-foot embankment in Olympic national park, his mother has learned. The helicopter that had flown Dr. Techman to the scene was unable to land, but he was lowered from it to the victim.

Dr. Techman was called out on another helicopter mission in October in answer to a distress call from a Russian fishing ship 25 miles off the coast. Vaskoly Volkov, a Russian seaman, had suffered a broken collarbone, leg, and ribs aboard ship, and needed prompt medical treatment. Dr. Techman treated the injured seaman in the helicopter and ambulance that
