

312 Seniors Receive Diplomas at Lynch School Ceremonies

A class of 312 seniors received diplomas at the annual commencement exercises of the Wilbur H. Lynch High School held at 10 o'clock this morning in the school gymnasium. The Rev. William D. Orr, president of the Board of Education, awarded the diplomas to the graduates and Principal Robert G. Turner made the presentation of the large number of prizes and scholarships won by members of the class before a capacity audience of parents and friends.

As the High School orchestra played the traditional commencement march, "Theme from 'Pomp and Circumstance', by Elgar, the graduates, in white and blue caps and gowns and led by junior marshals Jean Wharton and David Richardson, filed into the gymnasium. Salutatory Address

Following the invocation by the Rev. Roland S. Fredericks, pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church, the exercises were opened by Miss Pamela G. Dillon, class salutatorian.

Welcoming the parents, teachers and friends to the exercises, Miss Dillon said that every member of the class realized the importance of this day and thanked those who had made it possible for him or her to achieve it.

"This day brings to an end one vital phase of our lives," she told her classmates, "but ahead is a future that will be as good or as ill as is our ability to detect the responsibilities of the mature people we are expected to be. What we have learned from our teachers, our home lives and our community will determine our plus or minus mark as we become adults."

Next heard were the essays which won the prizes given annually by the Amsterdam Evening Recorder. Irving W. Olender, winner of the first prize, spoke on "Pills for the Mind—A New Era in Psychiatry" and William C. Berning, who took second prize, presented his essay on "Fuel for the Future."

ALBANY (AP) — The New York Central Railroad showed its new Flexi-Van units here today and planned to start regular Albany-Chicago service tomorrow.

Flexi-Vans are special truck trailers that can be slid from their highway wheels onto specially designed flat cars in four minutes.

Service will begin with a freight leaving here at 3:45 a.m. Tuesday and arriving in Chicago early Wednesday morning. A companion east-bound service from Chicago to Albany is to be introduced.

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Statement on Fare Increase Clarified By Lines Manager

Benjamin F. Bartholomew, general manager of Mohawk Valley Transit Inc., today issued the following statement concerning the news story which appeared in this newspaper Wednesday, June 18. The news story was about the increase in fares which the company proposes to put in effect July 21.

Bartholomew's statement was as follows: "The story concerning our company's proposed fare increase, which appeared in this paper Wednesday, June 18, was substantially correct but so that the facts as known to me concerning the Public Service Commission's position to date in this matter may be correctly stated, the following data is presented:

"Financial data and statistics clearly showing the need for the fare increase have been presented to the Public Service Commission and the new tariff will go into effect on July 21, 1958, unless objections are raised. The statement that the Public Service Commission had consented to the increase without the usual 'formality' is not correct.

"Inasmuch as the tariff has been filed with the commission under normal procedures, we assume that they will act on it under its normal procedure. The commission staff is aware that the proposed fare increase represents the company's last effort to continue operations."
